## Liz Jemmett is a Paediatric Advanced Clinical Practitioner in the PANDA Unit in Northern Care Alliance



Liz Jemmett initially trained as a paediatric nurse and has since spent 20 years working within Paediatric Intensive Care Units, working in a variety of roles, such as staff nurse, sister, working on the transport service, and clinical educator. Liz has always had an interest in education, therefore she undertook a PgCert in teaching. She now utilises these skills as an Advanced Practitioner, developing teaching and learning opportunities for the multidisciplinary team. She now works in the PANDA Unit at Salford Royal.

Liz began her Advanced Clinical Practice (ACP) training in 2015 after she was put forward by The Royal Manchester Children's Hospital (RMCH) as they highlighted a need to provide a highly skilled team to provide care for children, young people, and their families.

In her ACP role, Liz works alongside a range of health care professions such as physiotherapists, nurses, doctors, pharmacists, paramedics, and community teams.

On a daily basis Liz is required to use her high level of clinical skill to respond to and treat children presenting acutely to A&E with undiagnosed/undifferentiated conditions. Using advanced skills identification. her in the assessment, treatment, and management of children and their families she is able to ensure the best possible care is delivered.

Autonomous working and decision making are required in her role, alongside effective teamwork. This also involves the supervision of other multidisciplinary team members. Liz uses her nonclinical time to work on the education and research pillars of advanced practice. She is currently developing a module to support the development of emergency nurse practitioners. Conducting audits and acting on results to bring research into practice enables her to work within the research pillar while improving quality of care.

Liz is extremely passionate about helping children, young people, their families during incredibly difficult times. She works hard to encourage her team to develop their skills and supports them through their development, to improve the patient journey.

Liz gives an excellent standard of clinical care and this is because of her exceptional knowledge base, and her gained experience in clinical education, she offers methodical evidence based care and is responsive to specific patient needs."


